BBN-ANM-401 Debating issues in the media

Objectives:

This course aims at developing the participants' debating and presentation skills in English and at examining controversial issues related to the media. In order to prepare for the debates, we will look into the background of the topics through readings as well as through the participants' presentations. This will help gather and analyse information and gain a better understanding of the issues. We will integrate content and form by also focusing on language development. Sessions of presentations and debates will alternate.

Requirements:

- regular attendance and participation
- thorough preparation for classes, all assignments have to be completed
- completion of an expository essay of 800-900 words and a regular journal of the readings
- giving at least one major oral presentation and several oral reports on readings
- taking part in as many debates as the size of the group allows

Rules:

- Assignments have to be completed/submitted on time. Absence from class is no excuse for not writing an assignment or not preparing for the following class.

- If you know you'll be absent from class when your presentation is due or when you are scheduled for a debate, send a message to hollo.dorottya@btk.elte.hu as soon as you know, so that the necessary arrangements can be made. Also, if possible please try and swap tasks with a group mate. If you have to cancel on the day of the presentation, ring 460 4407 (The joint DELP & DELG department office).

- Late work will automatically be given a grade a full mark lower.

- If you miss more than three classes you will be dropped from the class list and will not be given a mark for the term's work.

Assignments:

- Presentation: The presentation (10-15 minutes) should be the summary of a controversial issue related to the media. It should outline the background of the issue and arguments for its various facets. The presentation should not be a theoretical discussion of the issue, but concrete cases must be used to illustrate it. Apart from covering the content, the presenter is requested to draw attention to important language connected to the topic. The presentation must be accompanied by a handout covering both the topic and the relevant language, e.g. vocabulary. Please indicate useful sources on the handout, too. Please bring a handout for everyone in the group. - Essay: An 800-900-word-long expository paper discussing a controversial issue that has been treated in class. Deadline: 3 May. (no extension is given) The purpose of the expository paper is to present a controversial issue from as many angles as possible/relevant objectively, without taking sides or wanting to influence the readers. However, it must provide the readers with enough information in order for them to take a stand. The topic may not be the same as that of the presentation. The title or topic and outline along with some sources have to be submitted by 16 April.

- Reading journal: Those who do not present a topic also have to read articles related to it, and have to submit a reading journal. This is a very short **summary** of the readings for every topic discussed in class accompanied by personal reflections on the texts and the topics as well as a list of important/interesting language items learnt from the texts. The journal should also indicate the exact references of the texts in APA. (250 words/topic) Deadline: the first class dealing with each topic, i.e., the class when we have the presentations. The presenters of a topic do not have to submit a journal, since they must make a handout.

Format for the assignments:

- Put your name, the course title and the title of the assignment at the top of the first page.
- Use single spacing.
- Pages must be numbered and paragraphs indented.
